It has been a busy summer in the Village of Clinton. The Memorial Day festivities, as always, were a wonderful way to begin our summer.

Our Parade Marshal Roy Mosley, was born and raised in the Village of Clinton, graduated from Northwest High School, served in the military and had a distinguished career in law enforcement. Thank you, Roy, for all you have done for so many people throughout your career. A special thank you to our speaker, the Honorable Jill Lanzinger.

There have been many bench and brick dedications at the Ohio Veterans Memorial park. It does my heart good to see so many visitors to this park from all over the United States.

We were able to secure a Community Development Block Grant which allowed us to replace the roof on Village Hall and install handicapped door openers at no cost to tax payers. We are in the process to hopefully add an additional 500 feet of handicapped-accessible sidewalk to eventually reach the Ohio Veterans Memorial Park.

I am in the process of working with the Ohio EPA to close the Village landfill once and for all. The landfill has not been active since 1987 and we are waiting for EPA's final approval for permanent closure.

The planned road projects for 2017 came in under budget and the remaining budgeted funds will be used to improve the infrastructure of the Village.

Trick or Treat is scheduled for October 29, 2017 from 2 – 4 PM. We look forward to seeing all the young children in their costumes!

Feel The Heat Challenge, by City Manager, Mark Cozy

It was the summer of 2015. The State Fire Marshal's Office was sponsoring a meeting with Canal Fulton and Lawrence Township fire/rescue staff and public officials at the Eugene M. Fellmeth Safety Center. The State Fire Marshal challenged city and township officials to participate in the **Feel the Heat Course** at the Ohio Fire Academy.

Feel the Heat was developed to help local officials understand the demands of firefighting. Participants experience wearing Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA.) They can participate in search and rescue operations, auto extrication demonstrations, observe the operation of a ladder truck from its 'aerial platform,' extinguish live fires inside the Academy's burn building, and experience the honor of the job our fire personnel must be always prepared to perform.

Lawrence Township Trustee, Shawn Lockhart, and City Manager, Mark Cozy, responded to the challenge. Canal Fulton Fire Chief, Ray Durkee joined them and Lawrence Township's Chief Mark Stewart and Assistant Chief Dan Podlogar provided them support with their gear. The course was challenging, but rewarding, and the staff at the Academy put everyone's safety first.

Last year, Trustee Lockhart and City Manager Cozy issued the **Feel the Heat** challenge to all City and Township officials. City Council

member Dan Bucher responded and joined the crew this time at the Wayne County Regional Training Facility. Trustee Lockhart and City Manager Cozy are issuing the **Feel the Heat** challenge again this year to all City and Township officials. This year they plan to go back to the Ohio Fire Academy.

I have talked to Jeremy Graber, the owner of the "The Voice of Canal Fulton" website about the criteria he uses to determine if posts can stay on the website. It is a huge responsibility to make those decisions. I wish him well with his decision-making. I think we all have witnessed examples across America of the viciousness of people on social media and the many resulting tragedies. It is like rushing to the scene of an accident without any intention of helping the

victims. We log in and become entertained by the maliciousness one human being can show toward another.

Aren't we better than that?

Here in our community, I think we are. Before logging in to social media, ask yourself what is in your heart? So, it was on May 6th in 1968 that the Canal Fulton Heritage Society was officially signed into being.

The Canal Fulton Heritage Society has taken on the responsible caretaking of three Historic District downtown properties since transferring the care and operation of all things "canal" to the City of Canal Fulton and to Stark Parks. That portion of our area's history is being well-nurtured, and gratefully so. But, the Oberlin House, the William Blank House, which serves as home to The Dragonfly Tearoom--and the Heritage House Museum, are also in constant need of attention. (Add the Dry Dock on the canal to this list!) We thank the members of the Lions Club of Canal Fulton for signing on as partners with CFHS to address and rectify the list of repair needs at the Oberlin House. In addition to this local involvement, an Ohio History Fund Grant has been submitted by the CFHS to garner funds for upkeep. Remember, each place under the care of the CFHS is home to many a story.

Speaking of stories, Linda Simon, just one of CFHS's members, is spearheading the revitalization of a project now entitled, "Tales of Our Town: Canal Fulton." She and a group of like-minded others—including an intern from Walsh University--are seeking, listening to, and recording "remember when's" shared by area residents who want to preserve and honor past memories. 

Facts About Our Historical District

- ~ The district is a floating zoning district. Most of the Historical District is the original Village of Canal Fulton. It runs north and south from Saint Phillips and James to Buck Chevrolet and east and west from the railroad tracks to Fulton House Bed & Breakfast. Here you will see a map of the Historical District. The dots on the map represent the area where the Historical District is located.
- ~ The homes/buildings that are in the Historical District need to be maintained in their original appearance. This meaning paint, architectural structure and general appearance of the home/building. When needing repair/remodel of the structure, the owners of the building/house must seek approved from the Zoning Inspector and HPC (Historic Preservation Commission) to make sure that the repair/remodel meets HPC and Zoning standards.

Canal Fulton YMCA Planning Update from Mark Cozy



Plans for the Canal Fulton YMCA continue to move forward. City Council plans to donate seven acres of

land along Erie Ave to the YMCA. Four of those seven acres were secured as park land through a \$200,000 donation to the City from Roland Lindsay of Lindsay Precast Concrete. This donation along with a \$1 million pledge from Don Schalmo provided the catalyst to begin moving the project ahead. The City also intends to contribute a total of \$45,000 towards water and sewer lines. This will be paid back through user fees for water and sewer services. No new taxes will be requested for this project.

The YMCA has two potential partners expressing an interest in working with the YMCA. The Canal Fulton Rotary Club and Northwest Stark Senior Citizens Commission are both looking to make the new facility their new home.

Both the Rotary and Senior Citizens Commission would require a full service kitchen and additional meeting room space. This could be funded, in part, by the sale of their respective buildings that are owned by the Rotary and the City.

The YMCA plans to apply for a grant through the State of Ohio to pay for this part of the project. Other partners being approached are in the medical and education fields. Current plans for the

Canal Fulton YMCA include a health and wellness center, gymnasium, indoor walking track, program spaces, youth game room, preschool play area, locker rooms, whirlpool, sauna and a low depth entry recreational style swimming pool.

The Canal Fulton YMCA Board has appointed a fundraising committee. They will pursue grants through the Stark Community Foundation and other sources. They will also be taking pledges from the community.

A Message from Johnson M. Belford, Zoning Inspector



As we go into late summer, and then early fall, you need to be aware of your responsibility as

a property owner and/or tenant. The City of Canal Fulton has established an **Exterior Property Maintenance Code.**

The purpose of this code is to establish minimum standards to maintain the exterior of all buildings in the City and to provide that these buildings are safe, sanitary and do not constitute a blighting influence on the community; to fix responsibilities for owners and occupants of structures that need maintenance, and to provide for the adoption of rules, and to fix penalties for violations thereof.

Section 1361.03 MAINTENANCE RESPONSIBILITIES

(a) No owner or operator shall occupy rent or lease, or offer rental or lease, any structure or any part thereof which does not comply with the provisions of this code.

The owner or operator of every building or structure shall be responsible for maintaining a clean, safe and sanitary condition, the shared common areas of the premises, including all yard areas, walks, driveways, parking lots, and including the public side walk area adjoining the building on the public right of way. The owner, or operator, shall be responsible for SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL, RUBISH REMOVAL and other obvious activities relative to the maintenance of a safe and sanitary structure.

Section 903.09 REMOVAL OF WEEDS BY OWNER OR OCCUPANT

The owner, occupant or person having I wanted to me the charge or management of any lot occupant of the or parcel of land situated within the corporation limits, whether the same be improved or unimproved, vacant or occupied, WITHIN 5 DAYS WRITTEN owner's responsibilities. NOTICE, served in conformity with Ohio R.C. 731.51, shall cut or destroy or cause to be cut or destroyed any noxious or poisonous weeds or vines growing

upon any lot or parcel of land, and prevent from blooming or going to seed or EXCEEDING A HEIGHT OF EIGHT INCHES.

Section 903.10 REMOVAL OF TREES, WEEDS, GRASSES BY MUNICIPALITY

In the event the owner does not trim or remove any tree, plant or shrubbery, or any part thereof, in accordance with the provisions of this chapter, then the Manager is authorized and it is declared to be his duty to have enforced the provisions of this chapter, and to cause to be trimmed or removed such tree, plant or shrubbery, or part thereof and cut and remove all grass and weeds.

I know that this is a lengthy article, but I wanted to make both the owner and occupant of the property aware of their responsibilities.

In the future, I will cover a property owner's responsibility for care of trees in the public right of way.

LEAF PICK-UP

The City will provide curb side collection of leaves in the fall months. Pick-up dates are October 16th through November 22nd. Residents are asked to place their leaves along the curb outside the paved area of street. STORM WATER POLLUTION

Please call **330-854-2225** to report spills along roadside ditches, catch-basins and other storm water structures.

SNOW BAN PARKING RESTRICTIONS

- (a) Whenever, during any period of twenty-four hours or less, snow falls in the City or in a section or sections thereof to a depth of two inches or more, an emergency is declared to exist in that such a heavy snow storm constitutes a serious public hazard impairing transportation, the movement of food and fuel supplies, medical care, fire, health and police protection, and other vital facilities of the City. Such emergency shall continue until an announcement by the City Manager that snow plowing operations have been completed, which announcement shall be made in the same manner as outlined in subsection (b) hereof.
- (b) Whenever, such emergency exists, the City Manager shall request the cooperation of local press and radio station to announce the emergency and the time that emergency parking regulations will become effective, which time shall be no sooner than one hour after the first announcement, and such announcement by one local radio station or in a daily newspaper of general circulation published in the City shall constitute notice to the general public of the existence of the emergency. However, the owners and operators of motor vehicles shall have full

- responsibility to determine existing weather conditions and to comply with the emergency parking regulations.
- (c) During the period of emergency, the City Manager may prohibit the parking of any vehicles upon any or all of City Streets as Council may authorize him.
- (d) During the emergency, no person shall park, or cause to be parked or permit to be parked or permit to remain parked, or to abandon or to leave unattended, any vehicle of any kind or description upon such specified streets; provided, however, that vehicles may be parked for a period of not longer than three minutes for actual loading or unloading of passengers or thirty minutes for actual loading or unloading of property; provided, further, that no other ordinance restricting parking as to place or time is violated thereby.
- (e) Any motor vehicle parked in violation of this prohibition may be impounded by the City at the cost and expense of the owner thereof; provided, that in the event the City Administrator authorizes additional emergency equipment to be used the fees to be charged for towing and storage by the authorized agents shall conform to the fees as assessed by the City for the same service.







Northwest Fire Explorer Post 1854 By: Captain Shawn Yerian

Background:

The Northwest Fire Explorer Post 1854 is a career development program aimed at the Fire and EMS service. It is sponsored by the Canal Fulton and Lawrence Township Fire Departments. The Ohio Fire Explorer Program is comprised of young men and women from 6th grade until 18 years old who assist the fire department in community service. The Fire Explorer Program allows students to gain a better understanding of the Fire Service and its career opportunities and provides valuable support to area fire departments. The fire explorers complete a training program to learn about the fire department and to prepare themselves for a career in the Fire Service. Bi-weekly meetings attended by the explorers provide them with instruction in areas such as: First Aid, CPR, Firefighting Tactics, Vehicle Extrication, Fire Safety and Training for Competitions.

About Us:

Our members come from Northwest Local, Jackson, Manchester, Tuslaw, North Canton, Massillon and other surrounding school districts. Fire exploring teaches young adults about Fire and EMS career fields. Explorers receive both Fire and EMS training that will help prepare them for a future career within those respective services. We currently have 12 advisors and approximately 30 fire explorers. We maintain open enrollment throughout the year.

Who We Are:

The Northwest Fire Explorer Program is a youth-based organization chartered by the Canal Fulton and Lawrence Township Fire Departments through Learning for Life and Boy Scouts of America that focuses on Fire Service Exploring. The organization allows teens and young adults to see, experience and train on many aspects of typical firefighter duties. This includes all aspects of the firefighter's job from emergency medical procedures to placing ladders and live fire training. The intent is to allow the participants the opportunity to see what being a firefighter is "all about" before committing to a career in the Fire Service. We have a strong focus on volunteer and community service work.

Brief History:

In the spring of 2011, the program was restarted after several years of inactivity. Since then, we have gone from about 5 members to over 30! The post has been rebuilding itself ever since. We've had great success and have made excellent progress by emphasizing physical fitness, instruction, volunteering and practical activities. Our goal is to help members develop into productive citizens of the global community while learning about discipline, good work ethics and moral values from positive role models. We plan to continue building the program to be well recognized both locally and nationally.

It is a week-long Junior Firefighter Academy held at Hocking College, which provides classroom and practical training to further participants' knowledge, skills and abilities in firefighting and emergency operations. Essentially, it's a summer "band camp" for the Fire Service.

Our explorers, along with others from all over Ohio and neighboring states, gain insight in becoming long-term members of emergency services and community. This philosophy is achieved by increasing awareness among youth about volunteering and supporting the Fire and EMS services. Junior firefighters provide fire departments with additional help in accomplishing non-firefighting or non-emergency tasks.

This camp has proven to develop leadership for America's youth, who are tomorrow's leaders. This leads us to say, "Congratulations to Northwest Fire Explorer, Summer Knight!" Summer Knight received the 2017 OYFETA 1st Annual Trucker Dukes Award. In a room of over 100 parents, extended family members, camp instructors and junior firefighters, Maui firefighter, Joshua Dukes, father of the three year old Maui boy who inspired thousands across the nation as he battled a form of childhood cancer, announced Summer Knight's award via Skype.

It comes as no surprise that instructors and peers selected her for this award. Summer Knight is always in attendance at post meetings, fundraisers and a perfect role model for our younger explorers.

The "fire service" is in her blood, as her mother is also a firefighter for the North Lawrence Volunteer Fire Department. We are extremely proud of her accomplishments not only at the academy but throughout the year. There is no doubt she will achieve more awards and honors in her career path.

YOU AND YOUR FAMILY ARE FAST ASLEEP WHEN THE SMOKE ALARM SOUNDS: DO YOU KNOW WHAT TO DO?

Consider this scenario: It's 2 o'clock in the morning. You and your family are fast asleep when you awaken to the smoke alarm sounding and the smell of smoke. What do you do? If you and your family don't have a plan in place, it could jeopardize your safety, or even prove deadly. In a typical home fire, you may have as little as one to two minutes to escape safely from the time the smoke alarm sounds. That's why home escape planning is so critical in a fire situation. It ensures that everyone in the household knows how to use that small window of time wisely.

"Developing and practicing a home escape plan is like building muscle memory," said Shawn Yerian, Fire Captain of the Lawrence Township / Canal Fulton Fire Department. "That pre-planning is what everyone will draw upon to snap into action and escape as quickly as possible in the event of a fire."

This year's Fire Prevention Week theme, "Every Second Counts: Plan 2 Ways Out!" works to better educate the public about the critical importance of developing a home escape plan and practicing it. The Lawrence Township / Canal Fulton Fire Department is working in coordination with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), the official sponsor of the Fire Prevention Week for more than 90 years, to reinforce those potentially life-saving messages.

Fire Prevention Week is October 8-14, 2017.

Home escape planning is one of the most basic but fundamental elements of home fire safety, and can truly make the difference between life and death in a fire situation," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA's vice president of Outreach and Advocacy. In support of Fire Prevention Week, Captain Yerian encourages all Lawrence Township / Canal Fulton households to develop a plan together and practice it.

A home escape plan includes working smoke alarms on every level of the home, in every bedroom, and near all sleeping areas. It also includes two ways out of every room, usually a door and a window, with a clear path to an outside meeting place (like a tree, light pole, or mailbox) that's a safe distance from the home.

NFPA and the Lawrence Township/ Canal Fulton Fire Department offer these additional tips and recommendations for developing and practicing a home escape plan:

* Draw a map of your home with all members of your household, marking

two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit.

- Practice your home fire drill twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways out.
- * Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
- * Make sure the number of your home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find.
- * Close doors behind you as you leave this may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Once you get outside, stay outside.
 Never go back inside a burning building.



SAFER GRANTEE AWARD

Staffing for Adequate Fire & Emergency Response By: Captain Shawn Yerian

The Canal Fulton Fire Department was selected for an award totaling \$428,496.00 for Recruitment and Retention of

Volunteer Firefighters through the Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response Grant (SAFER).

The SAFER grant was created to provide funding directly to fire departments to help them increase or maintain the number of trained, "front-line" firefighters available in their communities. This grant also benefits our Fire Explorer Program, as it funds training specifically for them.

Specifics about the grant:

The grant length is four years with a grant total of \$428,496.00. The funding per year will be \$107,124.00 and there is no cost to the city. It is 100 percent funded by the Federal Government. This grant is specifically for recruiting and retaining volunteers and has nothing to do with full-time firefighters. There is no long-term obligation. We are not required to continue the program after four years. The program ends after the fourth year. At that time, I hope to reapply for another four years.

I would like to thank Mayor Schultz, Chief Durkee, City Manager – Mark Cozy and Bill Rouse for their continual support in obtaining grants. Over the past several years, we've been awarded, small but equally as important funding for our fire department:

2014: Ohio BWC Award - \$23,703.24 for two Stryker Power ambulance cots

2017: The Home Depot Foundation Community Impact Grant - \$3,000 for smoke alarms

2017: Local Government Safety Capital Grant \$85,506.00 for air packs

Also, Congressman Jim Renacci wrote in support of this grant and many others. Congressman Renacci has a long history of supporting firefighters and their pursuit of grants.

In summary, this grant was written to allow us to recruit and retain volunteer firefighters, specifically those graduating from our nationally recognized Fire Explorer Program. With this grant, we can now cover the cost to hire and outfit our next generation of firefighters. Additionally, they now have an incentive to attend college locally, study at the fire station and answer emergency calls when called up.

FIREHOUSE SUBS GRANT

North Lawrence Volunteer Fire Department received a \$19,530 grant from FireHouse Subs to bring the latest in thermal imaging technology to protect our residents.

When fighting a fire, smoke can quickly rob firefighters of sight, essentially "blinding" them and handicapping their ability to perform effectively, find the seat of the fire and/or locate victims. In the past 20 years or so, thermal imaging cameras (TICs) have been introduced into the fire service market, allowing firefighters to virtually "see" through smoke.

TIC's were originally used by the military, with law enforcement special operations units being among the first to adopt them for civilian applications. As TIC technology evolved, the fire service began to embrace it for use during interior structural firefighting.

Initial TIC units were handheld and bulky.

Today, advancements have been made to improve TICs. The new Scott Sight Masks have the TIC integrated into the mask, making it a hands free endeavor. The purchase of this new equipment will greatly enhance our ability to continue to serve our residents.

POLICE LEVY

On the November ballot, you will see a replacement levy for the Lawrence Township Police Department. The current levy expires at the end of 2018, and this will replace such levy at current property values. The replacement levy will generate an additional \$25,446.00 per year. One of the reasons we are asking the voters to approve the replacement levy is because our dispatching costs are going up over the next couple of years. Over a twoyear period, we are expecting to see an increase of 22 percent to 24 percent, which for us is approximately \$20,000.00 per year. ROAD BERM REPAIR



DREAM HOUSE RAFFLE

Traci and Ed Peltz have teamed with Schalmo Homes and Summa Health Foundation on a house raffle to raise funds to provide cold caps for cancer patients.

Traci Peltz was diagnosed with ductal cell carcinoma last year. A few weeks later as she approached her 52nd birthday, she had a double mastectomy. Shortly into her recovery she began chemotherapy. Every three weeks for four sessions, she traveled to Parkview Cancer Center at Summa Barberton for her treatment.

She was lucky. Doctors estimate she has a 6 percent chance of the cancer returning. Peltz will take medication for the next 10 years.

Standing at her side throughout the ordeal was her husband of nearly 29 years. Throughout the battle, Ed Peltz wondered what he could do to make things better for not only his wife, but for others facing the same uphill struggle.

After Traci Peltz's chemo treatments, the pair landed on an answer. They were going to a build a house.

Now others will have a chance to buy a raffle ticket to win the house with proceeds funding cold caps — head gear that helps prevent hair loss during chemo treatments — for use by those fighting cancer.

One of the devastating side effects of cancer treatments for Traci Peltz was the loss of her hair. "Men don't worry about a thing like losing their hair but for a woman it's different," said Ed Peltz, a former Northwest High School football coach.

He recalled the many times he sat with his wife during her treatment and watched the same women come into the center avoiding eye contact. Day after day, their balding heads held lower as they suffered the harsh reality of chemotherapy.

Thanks to an innovative cap, Traci Peltz was able to keep her hair throughout chemo treatments.

Her doctor was the first to tell Peltz about the cold cap — a drug-free and non-invasive scalp cooling cap that can help reduce the loss of hair. According to the Mayo Clinic, no treatment exists that guarantees hair won't fall out during or after chemotherapy. Several treatments have been researched as possible ways to prevent hair loss but none have been absolutely effective.

Among those is scalp hypothermia. During the treatment, infusions, ice packs or similar devices are placed on the head to slow blood flow to the scalp.

A chemo infusion is a systematic approach to killing cancer cells, said Sylvia Radziszewski, vice president of Oncology Institute and Health Breast Center at Summa.

Cold caps prevent the chemo from getting to the scalp, therefore preventing damage to the hair follicle, she explained.

"It wasn't fun," Traci Peltz admits. "We had to put it on an hour before (chemo begins) and rotate it every 20 minutes." The temperature would fall to 25 to 30 degrees below zero.

And the cost of the cold cap — \$500 per month rental fee plus the expense of dry ice needed to keep the cap cold — wasn't covered by the Peltzes' insurance.

Radziszewski said the cold cap therapy has been around for many years but across Northeast Ohio the majority of medical facilities are not offering it as an option. The caps are becoming more readily available with additional vendors now coming on board and they are becoming more scientifically proven.

Ed Peltz wanted to help other women like his wife, so he had the idea to raffle a house and use the proceeds to fund cold caps. He teamed with his employer, Greg Schalmo, president of Schalmo Homes, and Summa. Peltz was overcome by the generosity of the Schalmo family — including Don Schalmo, the company's founder and Greg's grandfather. "Greg always says you have to pay it forward and help others especially if you are in a position to do it," Ed Peltz said. The decision, Schalmo said, was a "no-brainer" and his grandfather's generosity got the ball rolling. "I've known Ed and Traci for a little while now and they are just excellent people," Schalmo said. "Once I knew they were on board with this I knew it was a great thing."

Schalmo is building a 2,230 square-foot, four-bedroom, three-and-a-half bath, house at 936 Cook Drive in Canal Fulton. The house, on a cul-desac off Summer Evening Drive in the Discovery Park subdivision, boasts a theater in the partially-finished basement and a first-floor master. It will be decorated by Traci Peltz and Schalmo's wife, Katie, and will include high-end finishes such as granite countertops and a walk-out basement that overlooks a working farm. "It has these beautiful sliding barn doors," Traci Peltz said.

The property is valued at \$318,000. Construction will be completed this fall.

The 2017 Summa Health Dream House will be raffled Oct. 24, during breast cancer awareness month. Tickets cost \$100 each and 5,000 tickets are being sold. The winner has the option off taking a cash prize of \$100,000 instead of the house.

The proceeds of the raffle will be used to provide cold caps at Summa's three treatment facilities in Parkview, Jean and Milton Cooper Pavilion in Akron and Lake Medina Pavilion in Medina.

Jessica Hudson, senior director of development at Summa Health Foundation, said details are still being worked out with vendors but the funding will support patient supportive care.

Under the agreement with the foundation, caps must be made available to anyone who will benefit from it free of charge. Raffle proceeds also will aid the Akron-based Stewart's Caring Place, a cancer wellness center that provides support services and programs for people and families battling cancer, and the Stephen A. Comunale Jr. Family Cancer Center in Akron. The Comunale Center provides financial assistance to cancer patients.

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Health Insurance Open Enrollment

What, Where, When, How?

Health insurance has become a hot topic in recent years with the launch of the Affordable Care Act aka Obamacare.
