### **New Historic Downtown Business Association Shakes Things Up in Canal Fulton**

Canal Fulton's historic downtown is experiencing a fresh wave of energy and collaboration, thanks to the newly formed Historic Downtown Business Association.

Spearheaded by powerhouse

businesswomen Leslie Wyman, owner of the Historic Pink House, and Tarrah Hale, owner of the Canal Boat Lounge, this dynamic group is comprised of passionate downtown business owners and city leaders working together to revitalize and reimagine the heart of the city.

At the core of their mission is a shared goal: to raise funds for revitalizing Historic Downtown Canal Fulton and to bring more people to experience the charm, beauty, and unique history of this canal town. The group aims to create new events, enhance existing ones, and promote a strong sense of community pride and involvement.

Among the influential members is Ann Doan owner of the Miller Doan Tavern, who is helping to lead the charge with event planning and fresh ideas. The association isn't just dreaming–they're doing.

Their first major event, *Melted on the Canal*, held on May 3rd, proved to be a hit, even on a cold and rainy day. Visitors from all across Stark County, along with familiar local faces, came out to enjoy a comforting variety of soups and

sandwiches from Canal Fulton restaurants and popular food trucks. The weather didn't dampen spirits... it only made the food and fellowship feel warmer.

And that's just the beginning. Next up is *Create on the Canal*—A Celebration of Creativity on August 9th, which promises to be a celebration of local artists, creativity, and culture. And yes, rumor has it a new mural may be on the horizon, adding color and character to the city's historic landscape.

With strong leadership, an energized membership, and a deep love for Canal Fulton, the Historic Downtown Business Association is poised to become a powerful

force in shaping the city's future- one event, one visitor, and one revitalized building at a time.

# **Prosperity and Success**

What do you think of when you hear these two words? Is prosperity growth, things getting better or perhaps making more money? Is success completing a project or getting a promotion at work? Prosperity and success are two things I pray for every day to happen in our city and community. They come to me from a verse in the

Bible that I recite from Joshua 1:8-9. This book of the law shall not depart out of thy mouth; but thou shalt meditate therein day and night, that thou mayest observe to do according to all that is written therein: for then thou shalt make thy way prosperous, and then thou shalt have good success. Have not I commanded thee? Be strong and of a good courage; be not afraid, neither be thou dismayed: for the LORD thy God is with thee whithersoever thou goest.

Spring is the time of year when we try to implement our project planning and budgeting from last year into action. For me as your Mayor it is when I make a list and start checking off projects that we start and hopefully complete on time and under budget. Here's what is on the list for this year. Electronics recycling day. July 19 from 9 AM- NOON in the parking lot between the Northwest Stark Senior Center and the Schalmo Family YMCA. Anything with a cord will be accepted; TVs, printers, toasters, cell phones and computers. They will remove your hard drive and return it to

you or crush it in front of you. Next is starting a new air-line replacement at the Butterbridge Sewer Plant. Our partners from the Stark County Sewer District will share 40% of the cost with us for this project. Begin drilling a new water well at the Water Street Water Treatment Plant. Begin a \$500,000 repair project at the Locust Street Water Tower. Start service to customers from the new water tower near State Route 21. Go out to bid and begin the Locust Street sidewalk project to connect the Historic Downtown to the commercial development sidewalk at Beverly Avenue. Complete final plans for a new splash pad, playground and restroom facility at the yet to be named Community Park between the Senior Center and the Schalmo Family YMCA. Present the fourth annual Canal Fulton Summer Concert Series at St. Helena Park Amphitheater. Install a temporary traffic light at the intersection of Locust and Elm Ridge Streets. Also, this year we are planning to install decorative lights over the south end of Canal Street similar to what we did last year from Cherry to Market Streets.

As always, I pray daily for everyone who lives in, works in or visits Canal Fulton. And for God's will to be done in our lives. Moreover, I give my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ all of the praise and glory for all of the prosperity and good success we so graciously received. Thank you all for your hard work, sacrifice and allowing me to serve as your Mayor.

After serving as Utility Billing Clerk and Assistant Finance Director, Traci took over as Finance Director in January 2025, and walked into some major issues, including losing our Income Tax Administrator in the heart of tax season. Outside the Finance Department, there are four other employees in City Hall, including myself. First is Alyssa Bettis, who started as the Clerk of Council and has added Economic Development Director to her resume. Alyssa does it all in this city, including being a board member with the Chamber of Commerce, Schalmo Family YMCA, and the new Historic Downtown Business Group. She is one of the main reasons for the success



Finally, we have the backbone of our staff: the Street and Utility workers who make sure our infrastructure is up to date and safe for our residents.



#### **Electric Aggregation**

We continue to receive a lot of calls on the electric aggregation program. We have done several articles and a video on this subject, but I just wanted to reiterate the major points. The energy consultant for Lawrence Township shopped the rates prior to the expiration of the program and selected the best rate available overall. Electric rates and options change daily so we encourage anyone concerned to check out the PUCO Apples to Apples website to shop all available options (energychoice.ohio.gov). Keep in mind that some rates come with additional fees attached. Also, if you select a short-term rate, you may not be able to join the

aggregation again should the rates continue to increase. At the township office, we always want to do what is best for the community and the residents. Keep in mind we all live in the community and will be enjoying the same rate change. We have been very fortunate to have had well below market energy rates for the last several years, which makes the adjustment more significant. If you still have questions, I would be happy to help answer them for you.

#### **Township Departments**

As always you will see our township departments out and about working for you. The police department and fire department are working hard at keeping the community safe and healthy. The road department is working on repairs from winter, preparing for chip and seal, berming, and weed control. Our new zoning inspector, Bill, will be out and about as well. Please keep in mind if you plan on doing any outdoor projects, they likely need a permit (i.e. pools, decks, garages, certain playsets and sheds, signs, home businesses, etc.). Don't worry, permits are typically quick and easy. If you are in doubt, give the township a call. We will be happy to help you through the process. Also, our zoning code requires yards to be mowed, weeds to be under control, and your property to be free of excess trash and debris. We do not want to hassle anyone; however, we are committed to keeping a community we are all proud of. Please help us with this effort.

### North Lawrence Sewer Project

Spring has sprung and our great township is in full bloom.
Last fall I wrote an article about the North Lawrence Sewer
Project. The contract was awarded, and work has begun on
the project. It is slated for completion in the summer of 2026.
This project is funded by Stark County Sanitary Engineers; it is

not a Lawrence Township project and not funded by any Township funds. The sewer will provide service to 94+ North Lawrence residents only. I know there might be some confusion; so, if you're not one of the 94+ residents, you will not be affected by the project.

#### **Lawrence Township Park**

Another great addition you should see soon at the park will be lighting for the pickleball and basketball courts. This project is made possible because the Township applied for and received a Capital Improvement Grant. Along with the lighting project, the Township will be installing an LED message center which will be installed along the walking path and State Route 93.

#### House Bill 315

On the State Level, Governor DeWine passed and signed HB 315 that went into effect April 2, 2025. This bill will help townships with ongoing issues such as countless records requests for body cam footage; there are groups that thrive on this and then post and profit from these requests. This new bill will allow the Township to charge for these services if requested.

Another part of this bill helps our Zoning Department (posted on our website).

- HB 315 changes the way townships enforce zoning violations. Instead of criminal fines, violations are now classified as civil violations, potentially reducing enforcement costs.
- Townships can now enforce zoning violations by filing a civil action in the Court of Common Pleas.
- The bill allows for the combined collection action with a cause of action for injection, abatement, mandamus, or other appropriate relief.
- Each day of violation continues is considered a separate offense, starting from the day the judgment granting relief is issued.

This bill also updates public notice requirements. The Township can now save money by posting notices and special meetings on its webpage and Facebook page. This will eliminate the cost of having to publish in the local paper, so please keep up to date on what's going on in the Township by checking the webpage and Facebook account. Another new addition that residents will be seeing around the Township is Bill Hostler, the new zoning inspector. Bill started the first of the year and has replaced (retired) Frank Melito. Along with seeing Bill the Township has repurposed an old police cruiser as a zoning vehicle.

We're excited to share that thanks to a \$19,556.00 grant from the Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation, we've been able to replace our out-of-service/unrepairable 22-year-old inflatable water rescue boat with brandnew, upgraded equipment! This includes a new ONE Rescue Boat - inflatable rescue boat, trailer, motor, and essential accessories, greatly improving our water rescue capabilities.

This grant not only strengthens our ability to serve our own community, but also helps us work toward establishing a FEMA-typed boat team to assist surrounding communities in Stark County. As the county works to form a county-wide TROT (Technical Rescue Operations Team) with a focus on water rescue, this new equipment will be a vital asset.

Many of our members are trained in swift water rescue, including two members who serve on the new county-wide TROT (Technical Rescue Operations Team).

Canal Fulton - Lawrence Township Fire Department is committed to securing grants like this to ensure we have the best lifesaving equipment possible–all without placing a financial burden on the residents of the City of Canal Fulton and Lawrence Township.

# Meet Our New Full-Time Firefighter/Paramedics



We are proud to welcome Mason Pierpont and Travis Poznik to the Canal Fulton and Lawrence Township Fire Department as our first full-time firefighter/paramedics.

These landmark positions were made possible through your support of Issue 4 (the Canal Fulton Fire Levy passed last year) and a cooperative staffing agreement between the Canal Fulton City Council and the Lawrence Township Trustees. This partnership, along with the critical funding it provides, allows us to strengthen staffing levels and invest in future capital improvements–key steps in building a more stable, responsive fire and EMS department.

This advancement ensures consistent, high-quality fire and emergency medical coverage across both Canal Fulton and Lawrence Township. The addition of full-time paramedics significantly enhances our ability to deliver advanced care when every second counts.

Paramedics like Mason and Travis are specially trained to perform life-saving procedures in the field, including:

- IV therapy and medication administration
- Advanced airway management
- Cardiac monitoring and defibrillation
- Trauma and critical care interventions

As part of our long-term strategy, we are working toward placing a full-time paramedic on every shift–ensuring faster, more effective care at the scene, often before the patient even reaches the hospital. To get there, we are proceeding responsibly and hope to add a third full-time paramedic as funding allows.

Please join us in welcoming firefighter/paramedics Mason and Travis as the newest full-time members of our department.



# **Open Burning Regulations in Canal Fulton and Lawrence Township**

Residents of Canal Fulton and Lawrence Township are reminded that open burning is regulated under both local ordinances and Ohio state law. To reduce the risk of wildfires and protect air quality, Ohio enforces seasonal burn bans during the months of March, April, May, October, and November–prohibiting most open burning between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m.

In Canal Fulton, open burning is generally prohibited in restricted areas unless specific exemptions apply. Small recreational fires, such as campfires or cooking fires, are permitted if they are fueled with clean, seasoned wood, not used to burn trash, and do not exceed three feet in diameter and two feet in height.

Burning of yard waste, garbage, or construction materials is not allowed without prior approval from the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency. Violations may result in fines of up to \$1,000 per day.

### **Keep Our Township Clean and Tidy!**

As the growing season is in full swing, I'd like to remind everyone of the importance of keeping your property well-maintained. Township zoning regulations require that all grass be regularly mowed, and weeds kept under control. Properties that are not properly maintained may be subject to zoning citations and fines.

I understand that sometimes life gets busy, and maintaining your yard can become a challenge. If you are unable to keep up with lawn care, please don't hesitate to reach out to the Lawrence Township Office. I am happy to discuss your situation and work with you to find a solution before any enforcement action is taken.

Let's continue working together to keep Lawrence Township a beautiful, safe, and welcoming place for everyone.

### **Township Zoning Uses**

Most properties in Lawrence Township are zoned residential use – either R-R (Rural Residential) or R-1 (Single-Family Residential). Only a small number of properties fall under Business or Industrial zoning. Some properties within the R-R zoning category may qualify for an agricultural exemption. This exemption was added to our zoning regulations to support our local farmers by allowing certain agricultural buildings without the usual permitting requirement.

However, it is very important to understand that any building constructed under the agricultural exemption must be used strictly for farming or agricultural purposes. This exemption is not intended as a workaround to avoid obtaining the appropriate permits for residential or commercial structures. Misusing this provision not only violates township zoning rules but also puts our farmers at risk.

There is legislation currently in progress that may introduce stricter regulations surrounding agricultural exemptions. If the system is abused, we risk losing this important protection for those who truly depend on it. Please don't ruin this for our hardworking farmers. Respect the rules, and if you're unsure about your zoning or building permit requirements, contact the Lawrence Township Office before starting any construction.

Let's work together to preserve the intent of these exemptions and continue supporting agriculture in Lawrence Township the right way.

### Planning a Pool? A Zoning Permit is Required

As summer approaches, many residents are thinking about adding a pool to their property for some backyard fun and relaxation. Whether you're installing an in-ground, above-ground, or even a temporary pool, please be aware that a permit is required before installation in Lawrence Township.

Zoning permits help ensure your pool complies with safety regulations and local ordinances, including setbacks from property lines, fencing requirements, and avoiding conflicts with underground utilities or septic systems.

# Already Installed a Pool Without a Permit?

If you've already installed a pool without first obtaining a permit, I ask that you please apply for one as soon as possible. The Lawrence Township staff will begin conducting routine inspections and sending notices later this summer, and I'd much rather help you get into compliance now than issue a formal notice later.

#### Why the Permit Matters:

- Ensures your pool is safe and legally placed.
- Prevents zoning violations and potential fines.
- Helps protect neighborhood safety and property values.


#### How to Apply for a Permit

That's how it works. The Little Library will be maintained by Friends of the Canal Fulton Public Library. We are grateful for their generosity and Carter's craftsmanship.
