Update on various township happenings going into 2025

New Staff: We are happy to welcome two new members of our Lawrence Township administration team. Aimee Stutz is the new Administrative Assistant filling the vacancy left by Kristin Letham. Bill Hostler has accepted the position of Zoning Inspector and is training in preparation for the retirement of Frank Melito in February. We also repurposed one of our retired police cruisers for zoning use, so you will be seeing that out and about the township!

Major Projects: There are several large projects in the works within the township. We have confirmation that the county commissioners have authorized the construction of a sewer system in North Lawrence. This is a project years in the making and was a focal point of former Trustee Les Kamph and more recently Trustee Sean Roseman.

At the corner of Rt. 93 and Orrville Street, we will be getting a roundabout courtesy of ODOT in the summer of 2028. After an analysis of traffic and crash data this was determined to be the best course of action. Funding for this project is approved and

estimated at approximately 3.3 million dollars. It will be paid for by the State of Ohio through ODOT.

A cell tower is set to be erected on Cutten Avenue near Weygandt Street. According to the zoning presentation this tower will help fill gaps in coverage and presumably shoulder some of the extra load during Country Fest.

In addition to these major projects, we also have seven homes under construction in the township along with one commercial addition at Midwest Knife, and a wedding venue in the planning stages. It is always great to see our community grow in positive ways.

Other Items of Note: I want to thank The SAM Center for hosting us and the rest of the Stark County Township Association at their facility on Rt. 93 in October. The SAM Center is a fantastic organization providing a variety of programs and services for our veterans. Visit them online at: www.servingareamilitary.org.

I also want to thank all of our township staff in every department for their hard work in 2024. We have a lot of fantastic people working for our community every day.

Sanitary Sewer Project

There have been some rumors about North Lawrence and the Sanitary Sewer Project. Well, great news North Lawrence residents, the Stark County Commissioners have signed a contract for almost 10 million dollars to install sewer to its 90 plus residents. This project will be funded by Stark County using its ARPA Funds (American Rescue Plan Act) and the only cost to the residents will be a \$200 tap fee and the cost of hiring a contractor to tie their home into the sewer. This is going to be a great project, and it has been needed for several years. The project is scheduled to start early spring of 2025 and be completed in late summer of 2026. Please be understanding as with any construction project, plan on detours, delays, and messy roads. When completed, it will be a great project for North Lawrence and Lawrence Township. I would like to thank the County Commissioners for funding this great project and past Trustee Les Kamph for starting the process several years ago.

Winter Fire Safety Tips

SPACE HEATER SAFETY

New Fire Truck Expected July, 2025



We are pleased to share that we will be replacing an outdated fire truck in Lawrence Township, which has been in service for 28 years, along with another fire truck from Canal Fulton that is 27 years old and has equipment that needs expensive repairs. Together, these vehicles have a combined service of 55 years and no longer meet the modern safety standards required for our firefighters. The National Fire Protection Association recommends removing fire trucks from service at 25 years.

Utilizing a federal grant for this regional purchase can avoid the high costs of replacing each truck separately, which could reach up to \$1 million each. Instead, Canal Fulton and Lawrence Township are each investing approximately \$228,000, resulting in significant savings for our local taxpayers in each community.

The purchase is a quint fire truck, a fire-fighting apparatus that serves the dual purpose of an engine and a ladder truck. Our focus has been eliminating duplication, pursuing grants, and choosing equipment that will serve our growing community for the next 25 years.

Our website focuses on providing department information and assisting with recruitment campaigns. Currently, fire departments across the country, especially in Ohio, are facing a shortage of part-time firefighters. In 2023, the Canal Fulton Fire Department was awarded a grant to help recruit new members. This grant covers the cost of our website and marketing materials.

Requirements for Zoning Permits

A Zoning Permit is required if you are constructing, enlarging, renovating, or building a garage, shed, pool, or signs. If you have any questions about whether a permit is required, please contact the Zoning Department at (330) 854-7118.

Permits may be obtained at the Lawrence Township Hall, Monday - Thursday, 8 a.m. - 3 p.m.

Building Permits

Building permits are required for commercial and some residential construction. The Stark County Building Department is located at 7235 Whipple Ave., NW Suite A, Canton, Ohio 44720 and should be contacted to determine if a permit is needed for your project at (330) 451-1770.

Health Department: Septic Permits

Septic permits for new construction are required in areas where sewer is not available. The Health Department also requires the review of any addition to a structure located in an area where septic is used. To determine if the location of your addition or alteration will affect your existing septic system, contact 493-9904.

Storm Water Management Plan

Since 2003, it has been a requirement for the Village of Clinton to address state and federal regulations mandated through amendments to the Clean Water Act. The requirements, referred to as the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) permit is implemented in urban and developing areas. This permit had been managed as a co-permitee of Summit County's MS4 until 2024. As of January 2025, the Ohio EPA now recognizes the Village as their own, separate MS4.

MS4 stands for Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System. It refers to a system of conveyances that collects and transports storm water from built-up areas to waters of the United States. MS4s can include:

- Roads with drainage systems
- Municipal streets
- Catch basins
- Curbs
- Gutters
- Ditches
- · Man-made channels
- Storm drains
- Pipes



MS4s listed above can transport polluted storm water runoff into local water bodies, often untreated. Polluted storm water runoff from MS4s can have negative impacts on the environment and human health. The overall goal of the program is to protect water quality by reducing or preventing pollutants from mixing with storm water runoff that flows into the Village of Clinton's owned and operated small MS4 and into waterways. So, to reduce the amount of pollutants discharged from MS4s, owners and operators are required to develop, implement, and enforce a Storm Water Management Program (SWMP). The Village Engineer and OHM Advisors are assisting the Village with their MS4 compliance.

Four Council Seats Up For Election in 2025

November 2025 will find the Village with four seats open for election. Currently, those seats are occupied by a newcomer who was appointed six months ago; with the remaining three seats held by multiple term Councilpersons. The remaining two seats are held by first time Council members, who have just completed their first year in office. Those two seats will be open for election November of 2027.

November may seem far off in the distance. However, if you've ever considered running for public office, it's not too early to investigate the possibilities. Do some research, attend Council and Committee meetings, and speak with former as well as current Council members. 
We had siding, soffits, and gutters replaced on our ambulance and brush truck bay. Looking to the near future we hope to have the same work done on the living quarters.

With high winds and unpredictable weather, the Village Hall has been designatedas an emergency shelter. Please make yourselves aware of the protocols our village has set in place.



I just wanted to serve my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and my fellow citizens. But, I would love to see a sidewalk to connect the historic downtown to the commercial end of the city. Little did I know that Bill began planning and budgeting toward that goal. And now, nine years later the goal is close to reality. I owe so much thanks to Bill for his wisdom, knowledge and understanding of how government works. I can't tell you how many times I went into his office and said, here's my idea am I nuts? And he said, yes you are. Then, two or three days later he would send me a podcast about how another community had done something similar to what I was thinking about. Bill gave me and members of Council confidence to know we were on the right path.

Perhaps his greatest accomplishment over the past 12 years has been the income tax reform of 2019. Many you may not recall that prior to 2020 Canal Fulton citizens who worked in another municipality had to pay that city's income tax rate and then had to pay another .75% to Canal Fulton. Along with the analytics of Bill Keltner, our current Income Tax Administrator, they presented the idea to me. Passing Issue #14 in 2019 enabled 70% of our citizens to save money on their income tax. In addition, it allowed the city to budget, save and pay cash for downtown renovations for lamp posts, crosswalks, traffic cameras, lights, remote read water meters, asphalt paving vehicle purchases, safety upgrade, increased staffing, software/technology upgrades and the amphitheater. Bill's legacy is the way he led with modesty, honesty, humility and love for the City of Canal Fulton. Best wishes Bill and thanks for a great ride and your unparalleled vision for our city.

Happy New Year! May your 2025 be the best and most prosperous year yet! As always, we have many exciting projects planned for the upcoming season. In this article, I want to let everyone know about three funding opportunities we received from the Ohio Public Works Commission to complete some

projects that have been in the works for quite some time.

- 1. The city received a zero-interest, 30-year loan to extend sanitary sewer lines on Cherry/Cherton St. to Route 21. I know live written about the new water tower several times, and you were probably starting to think I was crazy because nothing seemed to be happening. By the time you receive this Newsletter, the tower should be at least partially constructed. The tower, along with a booster pump station, are scheduled to be done later this year. In order for development to follow, the city needs to extend sewer as well. This loan will allow us to work with the property owners to accomplish this extension.
- 2. The city received a grant and a loan to make repairs to the East Side Water Tower. This tower, located near Skipco, will receive a fresh paint job as well as other necessary updates to keep the water safe for consumption. Our finance department has done a great job of budgeting money to allow us to finish them, but the grant we received will help alleviate some of the burden on our taxpayers. These repairs should begin in late summer/early fall.
- 3. And now the big one: The city received a grant for a Locust Street Improvement Project. This project is still taking shape, but as Mayor Schultz has discussed many times, one of the primary goals is to build sidewalks that will connect the Historic District with the East Side Business District. Other improvements being discussed include paving the street, addition of curbs, and water line updates. We will continue working with our engineer to determine how much we can accomplish with the money we received.

These projects, along with all of our traditional city events, will make 2025 a very busy year in Canal Fulton. I will continue to update everyone on the progress as we go.






